Detroit Sportsmen's Congress Junior Rifle Program

The Congress offers a very attractive and very active Junior Rifle Program that is open to youths, ages 10 - 17years. Over the past two decades, our team has earned many victory titles including the NRA/VFW National Postal Championship for the 6th year in a row. Our competitive team is well known from coast to coast and many team members have been invited to attend the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado for specialized instruction by Olympic coaches and to participate in the Junior Olympic Smallbore trials. We have some of the most talented shooters in the country competing on local, state, and national levels.

Now, we have several active members attending practice sessions each week to hone their skills in the indoor basement range shooting from the 50-ft. line. Practice occurs Friday nights from 7: 30 until 9:30 p.m.

If you are a junior, at least 10 yrs. old, come down on a Friday evening and give us a try. No shooting experience is necessary. The first night starts with a short safety and range procedures meeting and then you move to a spot

on the firing line to begin your new experience. You will receive expert coaching from our NRA Certified Instructors and will be carefully observed by our range safety officer. By the third week of shooting, a membership decision must be made to continue with our junior program. The DSC offers a youth membership for \$25 a year, if your family doesn't wish a full membership. This allows the you to use all of our equipment for free. You only pay a nominal range fee and the cost of a box of ammuni-

All shooters are processed through the NRA Marksmanship program. Shooters can earn their NRA Expert and Distinguished Expert classification levels. In small bore shooting, you basically compete against yourself while learning the basic skills and fundamentals. When your skill level indicates you are ready, you will be placed into competitive program with our traveling team. Remember, shooting is a legitimate sport and can be enjoyed at all age levels. There are college scholarships available to schools with participating teams. Come down on the range and give us a try. You won't be disappointed.

Well, January is already half gone and we are well into 2019 as I write this. The next big thing for the year will be to see if we have more winter to look forward to, or if spring is just around the corner. My bet is that we've got more winter to go, since it really hasn't seemed like we've had one (yet)! That will not help the skeet or trap scores, but it's a reality we have to face each year.

The **Skeet and Eat Practice League** kicked off January 14.
There were 15 individuals that braved the cooler temperatures to start practicing for the upcoming registered skeet season. The January session was a 12-gauge practice, with 20-gauge coming up Feb. 10. Both 28-gauge and 410 bore will follow in subsequent months.

A **Vintage Shoot** will be held Sat., Feb 16. Dust off the old side-by-sides and pump actions to get in on this one. This event (and the above Fun Shoot) is open to the public, so please consider coming out to join in the fun!

Finally, the first **registered skeet** event at DSC for 2019 arrives Sun., Feb 24. The **Snow Shoe Open** will host 12 -gauge and 20-gauge events.

This is the start of 12 registered skeet shoots that DSC hosts for all registered skeet shooters. We have drawn shooters from nearby states and Canada in the past and hope to continue with that fine tradition.



Junior Shotgun Practice will continue Feb. 3 and 24... dates *may* change so please call in to the Pro Shop to check. This is a great program and way to get your younger shooters involved in our sport!

Remember that the NEW 'WINTER' HOURS at Skeet and Trap are still in effect. The ranges will be open Wed. and Thur. from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. (rather than the spring/summer/fall hours of 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.). The reduced hours will be in effect until the Spring Leagues begin in late March. Weekend hours remain the same as always and the Pro Shop will still be open until 8 p.m. on week nights.

February will kick off with a Skeet & Trap Fun Shoot Sat., Feb9. The ever popular **FLURRIES** will be back, with two rotations being held at 10 a.m. and noon at Sporting Clays 5-stand field. If you have never shot FLURRIES, come join us as they are a blast to shoot. You and a partner (random draw) get to shoot at clays being thrown every 3seconds... first you shoot 2targets, followed by your partner shooting at two while you reload... and vice versa until you've shot at 25 targets. BUT, if you miss a target, your partner can try to shoot it. Since you can only load 2-shells in your gun at a time, you can see where this partner backup shooting thing can start to wreak havoc with the precise 2x2

rhythm you are trying to do... and that's where the serious fun begins.



There are two rounds per game and your total score is the sum of both you and your partner's two rounds. So come join us for the fun and possibly win a few bucks while you're at it. Entry is \$5 per rotation (2 rounds) and scoring will be done by Lewis Class. This means that the shooter field will be broken into 2 or 3 groups (depending on number of shooters) and there are winners for each grouping. That spreads the prize money around a bit more.

Rifle

It's wintertime and rifle activities have mostly moved to the indoor range. Smallbore Silhouette/Senior Smallbore is shooting indoors on the Basement Range, Monday afternoons starting at about 2 pm. You can shoot regular targets or the reduced range silhouette targets. The paper silhouette targets don't clang when you hit them, nor do they fall down but they are still good practice. Likewise, there is .22 rifle practice on alternate Sunday evenings starting at 6 pm. For this month, that means Feb. 3 and 17. Bring your .22 and have some fun.

There are still some activities on the outdoor range.
The ever popular "Ground

Hog" Shoot is/was Feb. 3. The 'ground hogs" are 2-liter pop bottles hung at 200vards. You shoot them offhand. The competition is based on the number of rounds used or the amount of time taken. There is another category for rimfires where you shoot 500-ml pop bottles at 50-yards. This is one of the best fun shoots of the year. More information on this shoot and others is on the DSC website (Current Events) or elsewhere as a flyer in this issue of the P&K. There is open shooting on the outdoor range Sundays from 11 a.m.-3 p.m. If the weather isn't bad, come on out to sight-in that new rifle you just bought.

Notable Americans "Crazy Horse" Daring, Aggressive and Courageous

Crazy Horse or Tasunke Witco was born as a member of the Oglala Lakota Indian Tribe on Rapid Creek about 40 miles northeast of Thunderhead Mountain (now Crazy Horse Mountain) in about 1840. It was a time when cultures clashed, and land became an issue of deadly contention and traditional Native ways were threatened and oppressed. Crazy Horse responded by putting the needs of his people above his own, which would forever embed him and his legacy in American History. Crazy Horse was killed at Fort Robinson, Nebraska when he went for a knife and was fatally bayoneted by a soldier around midnight on September 5, 1877.




Photo is a wooden bust of Crazy Horse's likeness. If you happen to visit Mount Rushmore, you should also visit "Crazy Horse Monument" located 17 miles southwest of Mount Rushmore.

The son of a medicine man, Crazy Horse spent the early years of his life being raised by women. Once he was old enough, he set out on one of the most important rites of passage to a Lakota warrior...the Vision Quest. "Crying for a vision" or "to pray for a spiritual experience". This rite of passage gave Cra-

zy Horse guidance on his path in life. He went alone into the hills for four days without food and water and cried for a dream to the great spirits. By the time Crazy Horse was in his mid-teens he was already a full-fledged warrior. His bravery and prowess in battle were well known by the Lakota people. He rode into battle with a single hawk feather in his hair, a rock behind his ear, and a lightning symbol on his face. The symbols and rituals that went into preparing for war provided the warrior power and protection. In 1866 Crazy Horse and a party of 10 decoys lured Brevet Lieutenant Colonel William J. Fetterman and 80 soldiers into an ambush. Until the battle of the Little Bighorn, the Fetterman Massacre was the army's worst defeat in the West. In 1876, ten years later, at the Battle of the Rosebud, Crazy Horse commanded more than 1,200 Lakota warriors against General George Crook and his 1,300 soldiers. Crook withdrew after six hours. Eight days later, Crazy Horse provided inspired leadership against Custer's 7th U. S. Cavalry Battalion at the **Battle of the Little Bighorn**, also known as Custer's Last Stand and the Battle of the Greasy Grass. Custer, nine officers, and 280 enlisted men, all lay dead after the fighting was over. According to tribes who participated in the battle, 32 Indians were killed. Without Crazy Horse and his followers, the battle's outcome would have been much different as he was integral in stopping reinforcements from arriving.

Despite these victories, the buffalo were virtually exterminated by **hide hunters**, and in 1877, under a flag of truce, Crazy Horse was forced to bring his **starving people** onto the reservation at Fort Robinson, Nebraska. Negotiations with U. S. Military leaders broke down. Eyewitnesses blame the breakdown in negotiations on the translator who incorrectly translated what Crazy Horse said. Crazy Horse was arrested. Upon realizing that officers were planning on imprisoning him, he struggled and drew his knife. Little Big Man, a friend and fellow warrior, tried to restrain him. As Crazy Horse continued to free himself, an infantry guard made a successful bayonet lunge mortally wounding the great warrior. He died shortly after the wound was inflicted.

What is PPC?

Is it just someone mispronouncing *PPC* (Police Pistol Combat)? Is it the renamed Precision Pistol Competition? Is it Politically Correct Correspondence?

Actually, it is none of these. It is the abbreviation for Pistol Caliber Carbine which is the latest division that was added by the United States Practical Shooting Association (USPSA). Since it's inception in 1976 at a meeting in Columbia, Missouri led by the late Jeff Cooper, USPSA competition has been geared toward handguns. There are quite a few DSC members that have been participating in these types of matches for 25+ vears and Father Time has caught up with some of us. Shooting a handgun with a "major" load has taken its toll resulting in "tennis elbow" and chronically sore body parts to a point where it's almost not fun anvmore.... Almost.

Then along comes this new division, PCC or "carbine" for short. This introduced a different weapon to the competition, a rifle or to be more specific, a carbine. We move from a 4 to 5 inch pistol length barrel to something with a 16 inch barrel and shoulder stock. If you have gone through the process to legally own a short-barreled rifle (SBR) those can also be used in this division if they include a stock that can be shouldered.

There are certain advantages and disadvantages to this new division. Advantage: It is much easier to hit a far distant target with a carbine than with a handgun. Disad-

vantage: It is much harder to move around crowded spaces like walls and barricades with a 16-inch barrel. Advantage: This is the only division in USPSA competition that allows a projected laser dot (the dot appears on the target) to be used. Disadvantage: They are heavier than a handgun so moving and running with them will take longer. Advantage: There is no limit to the magazine length, so you can put 50+ rounds in the gun, negating the need to change magazines during a course of fire.

The rules state that all calibers (9mm, .357 Sig, 40 S&W and .45 ACP) will be scored as a "minor" power factor and include a maximum bullet velocity of 1500 feet per second. Using ammunition that fits this profile in a 5-pound rifle certainly is much easier on the body than a racegun! The impact is against your upper body instead of through your hands, forearms, elbows and shoulders. As you can imagine, there is little to no recoil from a blowback operated 9mm carbine when they are setup with the correct springs. They are very easy to shoot and even easier to control, so keeping rounds in the high-scoring center of the target is relatively simple. For USPSA competition, an additional set of safety rules are enforced for carbines, above and beyond the rules that apply to handguns. Whenever carbines are on the range outside the "Safety Areas" they must either be in a gun bag, sleeve or have a chamber flag inserted. For all these conditions, the carbine is double checked to verify that the weapon is completely unloaded.

Are they fun? Let's relate a short story about a recent Saturday practice sessions. One of the guys, that has been shooting NRA High Power Service Rifle competition for several years, happened to stop by the basement to check out what was making noise on the range. Being familiar with the AR15 manual of arms, he immediately knew his way around the carbine. After spending a few minutes in the Safe Area checking out the trigger pull, he was ready to put some rounds on target. He got into the start position with the buttstock touching his belt, both hands on the carbine, manual safety on and the muzzle pointing downrange. At the timer beep, he shouldered the carbine and starting engaging targets, two rounds on each paper. Moving further down range, additional targets appeared and were engaged with two rounds each. When completed, he unloaded and showed the range officer the weapon was clear, pointed the carbine down range and pulled the trigger on an empty chamber, then placed the chamber flag back in the gun. All the while, this *huge smile was stuck to* his face.... Yes, it is a LOT of fun.

Some say that using a rifle in a handgun competition is like cheating. That may be, it just depends on what side of the trigger you're on. And it's still a heck of a lot of fun! Stop by one of the USPSA practices on Tuesday evening or Saturday afternoon and there might be a PCC on the range. If so, the owner might let you run some rounds through it, if they haven't run out of ammunition yet!
