Black Powder

November brings the cold, cloudy days and the first flurries of winter. Even so, Black Powder still has a few outdoor events on tap for the month. The monthly woods walk will be held Sunday, Nov. 10. There are 15hanging steel targets at distances of 25 to 60 yards. On the positive side, the leaves are mostly down so some of those targets that were hard to see in the summer are easily seen now. No experience is necessary. The ROs and other shooters are happy to help out the new guys. Bring your black powder gun and give it a try.

Tuesday mini-rendezvous' continue through the month. They begin in the morning and last through the day. Every so often, someone brings a Dutch oven dish to eat. This is another good event to shoot black powder in a relaxed atmosphere.

Black Power committee will run "Sight-In" at the rifle range for the end of the month as they have for many years now. The dates are Nov. 27, 29, 30 and Dec. 1. This is a good opportunity to tune up your muzzleloader for the primitive deer season or just a good opportunity to get out before winter shuts us in for the season.

Black Powder people are thrifty. Some might even call us cheap. To that end, I would like to point out that Joann Fabrics is a great place to save some money on loading and cleaning supplies. Two materials I have tested make for great patching ma-

terial: Drill 40 Unbleached, and Pillow Ticking Blue. Thickness for both fabrics is about 0.017" or so. If you use the ever constant 20% off coupon then the fabrics are about \$5 per yard. A yard will make 600-patches or Compare that with more. commercial patches at 100 for \$3, While your there, pick up some "White Cozy" flannel at \$2-3 per yard. This material is great for making cleaning patches. Finally, buy a rotary fabric cutter set. These cost between \$10-25. They make it easy to cut the patches cleanly and neatly to the proper size. Now you have something to look for when your wife drags you to the fabric store.

DSC Absentee Ballot Procedures

- After the November General Membership meeting, members may request the Detroit Sportsmen's Congress office mail an absentee ballot to them. The DSC takes no responsibility for any delays by the U.S. Postal Service, either in delivering or receiving of absentee ballots.
- 2. In the upper right hand corner of the ballot, you must legibly write your membership number.
- 3. Complete your selections on the ballot.
- 4. Place the marked ballot into an envelope and seal. Label this envelope "ABSENTEE BALLOT".
- 5. Place the sealed absentee ballot envelope and your DSC membership card into another envelope. Address and mail it to the DSC Office 49800 Dequindre, Utica, MI 48317, also mark it; Attention: Election Committee.
- 6. The DSC office staff will punch your membership card and your sealed ballot will be placed into the ballot box. If your membership card is not included, the sealed ABSENTEE BALLOT envelope will be declared invalid and destroyed. You must include a self-addressed stamped envelope so that your card can be returned after it has been punched. If a self-addressed stamped envelope is not included, the card will be retained at the office for you to pick up. It is not the responsibility of the office or election committee to affix postage to return your membership card.
- 7. When the election committee tallies the ballots, they will open each sealed "ABSENTEE BALLOT" envelope, remove the membership number located in the upper right hand corner of the ballot, and count them as regular votes. These envelopes will not be opened by anyone other than the Election Committee.
- 8. Absentee ballots must be received by the DSC office before 8 p.m. the day of the Dec. 4 annual meeting. It is the member's responsibility to respond in a timely manner.

I am currently a director, active with several committees in the DSC and a life member. I would like to take all my experience in this club and use it to put us on a sound and future-looking financial path.



Grounds and Planning

The Grounds and Planning committee identifies and prioritizes projects, both new construction and repairs around the club. This monthly column will keep the DSC membership informed about the projects and an estimated cost for each project.

Let's start by identifying a project that was completed about three years ago. As everyone should know the Utica campus sits on a land fill. This land fill must be maintained. On the rifle range is a 57-foot-deep sump pump pit. All the landfill areas drain into this pit. pump Occasionally, the needs to be replaced because the leachate (liquid in a landfill) is very corrosive.

This maintenance involves replacing the pump, pump controller, two flowmeters and 100 feet of stainlesssteel pipe. The cost was \$49,700.

Earlier this year, two septic systems were installed on the Utica campus. The first was for the clubhouse including the kitchen. A grease tank and pump tank were installed for the kitchen. Each tank is 500 gallons and require pump controllers. Also, two 1000-gallon tanks were installed with a drain field. The kitchen pump tank and the clubhouse rest rooms both empty into the large tanks. Sporting Clays also received a new septic system, a 500-gallon pump tank with controller and two 1000-gallon tanks. Because of the high water table, there is no drain field. The tanks will be pumped when full. The cost of this project was \$67,000.

We are getting closer to starting the new pole barn construction.. All the permits are in place. The next step is selecting a contractor. Estimates have ranged from \$100,000 to \$200,000. More info will follow as the project progresses.

Two projects which have just gotten underway are the land slide behind the office and the landslide by sporting clays station #3. Repairs to the sliding banks will be in the \$25,000 to \$30,000 range each. Jim Estes

US Cavalry (1865-1890) – Notable Military Leaders, Indian Wars George Armstrong Custer (1839 – 1876)

1st Vice President

George Armstrong Custer was a United States Army officer and cavalry commander in the American Civil War and the American Indian Wars. He graduated from West Point in 1861 at the bottom of his class. Due to a demand for trained officers at the start of the Civil War, he was brevetted Brigadier General of Volunteers at age 23 where he commanded the Michigan Cavalry Brigade. Custer did unexpectedly well in the Civil War. He fought in the First Battle of Bull Run, and served with distinction in the Virginia and Gettysburg Campaigns. After the Civil War, he was sent west to fight in the Indian Wars. In July of 1866, Custer was appointed Lieutenant Colonel of the Seventh Cavalry. June 25, 1876, while leading the 7th Cavalry Regiment at the Battle of the Little Bighorn in Montana Territory against a coalition of Native American tribes, he was

killed along with more than one third of his command during the action later romanticized as "Custer's Last Stand". On the verge of what seemed to him a cer-



tain and glorious victory for both the United States and himself, Custer ordered an immediate attack on an Indian village. Contemptuous of Indian military prowess, he split his forces into three parts to ensure that fewer Indians would escape. The attack was one of the greatest fiascoes of the United States Army, as thousands of Lakota, Cheyenne and

Arapaho warriors forced Custer's unit back into a long, dusty ridge parallel to the **Little Bighorn**, surrounded them, and killed all 210 of them. Custer's blunders cost him his life, but granted him everlasting fame. His defeat at the Little Bighorn made the life of what would have been an obscure 19th century military figure into the subject of countless songs, books and paintings. Flamboyant in life, George Armstrong Custer has remained one of the best-known figures in American history and popular mythology long after his death at the hands of Lakota, Cheyenne and Arapaho warriors at the Battle of the Little Bighorn.

Presidents Report: (R. Savo) Past President and the Life Members were recognized. • The Shelby Twp. Police Department was presented with honorary memberships in the DSC. • I am not sure if we will get the concrete for the new building. While we still have time, we are told that it is very difficult to get right now. • The gas alarm at the Rifle range has been going off. We did several tests to see if any gas was present to set it off and we found none. The gas alarm is only good for about 10-years and ours is several years past that. We have purchased a new one and I have sealed off any possible openings where gases from the landfill could be present. There is no evidence of noxious gases present. • We have been spreading topsoil around the club to bring up the soil to the top of the septic tanks to make the lids level with the rest of the ground. We are looking for shrubbery to hide them. • We have two erosion projects that are under way. That is why there are piles of concrete in the parking lot. There is an area behind the bar and the office that is badly eroded by the water from the culvert under Dequindre Rd. We have also an issue with the catch basin that drains water from the pistol and rifle range and it goes to Sporting Clays and then into the Clinton River. The catch basin is broken and it is under the drain pipe which is eroding the berm. If the weather cooperates we can fix it and get the water to go again into the river. • We are going to put a concrete walkway from the parking lot to the club entrance and down to the kitchen as well. We could use some help with this project and all the other projects as well. • We have increased our handicap parking in the lot. • One of the fan motors in the basement range failed and we have ordered a new one which should be in tomorrow. The range is still usable with only one exhaust fan working so we don't have to shut down the range. Secretary's Report: (R. Hegelman) The August BOD Meeting minutes and the September GM meeting minutes are on the table by the door and in the book behind the bar.

Treasurers Report: (D. Purdie) The financial results for August 2019 are available. Our YTD income for August is \$781,153.27. YTD expenses were \$688,458.85. The YTD net through August is \$92,694.42. Income for the month of August was \$92,061.66. Expenses for August are \$109,874.69. The July loss is \$17,813.03. Most of the expenses are from the large order we made for the pro shop last month due to the circumstances that I mentioned last month. • Our Ioan balance is \$103,942.25. I signed checks tonight for \$10,859.19. About \$5K is for the erosion projects. The financial reports are in a book behind the bar if you want to take a look at them.

1st Vice President's Report: (J. Estes) We will start digging up the ramps to the clubhouse, we will start next week. They will be replaced with new concrete ramps. The plan is to pour concrete next Thursday, and the handicapped ramp will not be available until the concrete dries. I will be sending out an e-mail to the club when the concrete will be poured. • For 2020, the Rifle committee wants to rebuild the range backstop. They are thinking about having a firm from Kentucky to do the work which may be over \$150K. The new rubber is projected to cost \$75K alone. • The skeet buildings will need new siding, and we are going to have to replace the concrete walkways there as well.
• The Life membership swap meet went very well. • The Cowboys are having practice from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturdays. We had a Cowboy on the 7th last month, we had a silhouette match last Sunday. We are having a 3-gun match on the 5th. We are keeping the attendance to 36-shooters because that is all we can handle on the Cowboy range. We are having our Cowboy Service Rifle match Nov. 13.

2nd Vice Presidents Report: (J. Rhodes) We had two incident reports last month. Unfortunately both were regarding firearms. One was someone who was banned from using our facilities and the other was just not mentally stable enough to be using our facility. We are all range officers. We are all members of our club. 
