History of Skeet & N SSA

Skeet differs from all other shooting sports, because it was originally developed to improve hunting in the field, and only later, because of its growing popularity, developed into a competitive sport.

Its development was actually brought about, because of the industrial revolution sweeping the country during the early 1900s. Rural areas began growing at incredible speed, into large, sprawling, industrial cities. Hunters were now finding it necessary to travel longer distances in order to find areas in which to hunt. When they finally arrived, they discovered the game was no longer as plentiful as it once was. Not only were hunters having a harder time finding game, but certain species had already been hunted into extinction. One example is the carrier pigeon.

The American sportsman soon began to realize, some form of game conservation would have to be enacted. Eventually, it was, with game seasons and bag limits, imposed on all hunters. Because of the shortened hunting season, hunters were now finding it harder and harder to get enough practice to become a decent shot. Some hunters turned to trap shooting to fine tune their hunting abilities. However, this was no help be-

cause of the lack of incoming and crossing shots.

In 1920, this problem was finally addressed by Charles Davis of Andover, Mass. He was the owner of a dog kennel and an avid hunter. He spent many hours trying to devise a way to improve his field shooting. After trying and discarding many different types of plans he finally settled on an idea based on a field, laid out in a 50-yard circle. He called it "Shooting Around the Clock".

Around the circle, he placed 12 shooting stations, with a single trap, located at station 12. Shooters would fire two shots from each station, and one from the center, equaling a box of shells, or 25 shots. This layout provided almost every type of shot a hunter would encounter in the field.

All went well, until the owner of the adjoining property complained of falling shot on his land. To avoid any future problems, Davis cut his shooting circle in half, and put a second trap at the opposite end of his shooting field. This became the birth of the modern day skeet field.

This hunting practice field became so popular, it soon developed into a popular shooting game.

Targets include the usual hanging steel targets for round ball and clay birds for shot. There are additional competitions for hawk and knife throwing. My favorite, though, is the fire-starting competition. Any of you who tried this in the Boy Scouts and were less than successful would be interested to see fires started with only flint and steel in 10 seconds or less by most of the competitors.

The next BP committee meeting is Feb. 7. Note that this will be a virtual (i.e. on-line) meeting. As some of the committee may not be up on the latest technologies, we will probably do a dry run sometime this month. Look for more information on how to sign up in the DSC Black Powder Google group.

Cowboy ~ The Cowboy Code

The Cowboy Code – Unwritten rules that came to be known collectively as “**The Code of the West**”.

As a more benign application, the “code” was sort of a frontier version of the Golden Rule. Before the American West was settled and barbed wire closed off the range, The Code of the West was one civilizing influence that could be relied upon. These American “cowboy codes” of the west were common sense approaches to cowboy and western etiquette. Many of the codes deal with horses, shooting and a little bit about women. In the unwritten code, there were certain principles understood by nearly everyone. For example “the contractual bond of a man’s word”.

In 2004, author Jim Owen, in his book titled **Cowboy Ethics-What Wall Street Can Learn from the Code of the West**, made a case for a new approach to business ethics – one that goes back to simple, timeless principles like those of the Cowboy Code. He also translated the unwritten Code of the West into ten principles to live by.

Code of the West:

1. Live each day with courage.
2. Take pride in your work.
3. Always finish what you start.
4. Do what has to be done.
5. Be tough, but fair.
6. When you make a promise, keep it.
7. Ride for the brand.
8. Talk less and say more.
9. Remember that some things aren’t for sale.
10. Know where to draw the line.

The iconic cowboy represents the best of America – the courage, optimism and plain hard work. Cowboys are heroic not just because they do a dangerous job, but also because they stand for something – the simple, basic values that lie at the heart of the cowboy way. Even though their way of life has changed during the last 150 years, cowboys still honor and live by their code. They are an abiding source of inspiration to do better and be better.

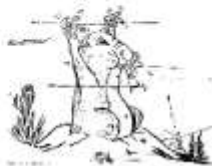
