American Heritage Girls

The girls involved had already earned their shooting sports badges and were learning new shooting skills. They learned to load and fire a 1/10 scale (3/4" bore) muzzleloading cannon using period procedures.

The target was a plywood pirate ship.

In addition, the girls also

learned of the history and heroism of 'Molly Pitcher' (Mary Hays). Mary 'Molly' Hays was a woman of the Revolutionary War who not only provided great service to the army as a water bearer, but took over loading a cannon when her husband was wounded.

Because of her service, including service in combat, 'Molly' Hays was awarded a military pension, a rarity for women of her time.

Muzzle Brakes. From my experience as a range officer at open shooting, it is becoming clear this rifle feature is a hot-selling item. Sometimes, close to half the number of guns on the range have one.

These devices are ports in the barrel near the muzzle that direct the hot powder gases back and to the sides of the shooter. They noticeably lessen recoil for the shooter. For example, the guys shooting the .50 cal Brown-ing guns would probably break their shoulders if their guns did not have this feature. The downside is for the people around them.

The muzzle blast is strongly felt by those to the sides of the shooter. And the noise that used to be directed forward is now directed back. It is a lot louder than a similar rifle without this feature. The blast is quite significant also. It can blow all the stuff off the adjacent benches.

Our traditional solution has been to isolate the muzzle brake guns from the other shooters. We moved the .50 cal shooter and his bench out to the service road and made sure nobody is shooting on lanes 1-4. This worked well when muzzle brakes were the exception.

What are we going to do now that it is typical to see 3 or 4 muzzle brakes on the line at the same time? We may need to figure out some sort of containment for them – specific times or specific relays for muzzle brakes. We may also need to require more PPE to protect hearing and sight. Those little foam ear plugs are barely adequate for the regular rifles but are no match for the muzzle brakes. What were the gun manufactures thinking when they started pushing these things?

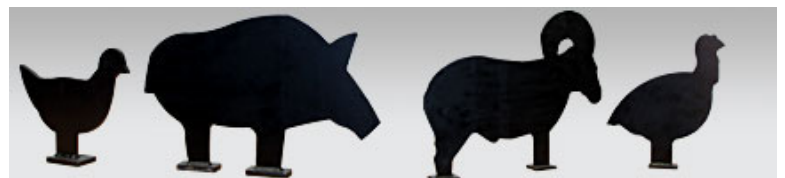

34th Annual MEMORIAL SHOOT

This public muzzleloading event is held each year to honor the memory of our muzzleloading enthusiasts that have passed on. The event will be held Sunday, Oct. 10, 2021 at the DSC Delaney Park Primitive Range Complex in Shelby Township, Mich. Competition will begin with a flag raising and memorial ceremony. Shooting competition is open to traditional muzzleloading long-arms. Modern in-line muzzleloaders and poly-patches are not allowed. Conical and jacketed bullets are permitted in rifled muskets. Sight-shades and scopes are not allowed on primitive arms. All loading will be done from pocket or pouch. Loading directly from horn, flask or can is not permitted. Eye and ear protection are required on the range. DSC COVID social distancing rules are in effect. Period, primitive dress is requested if you are shooting a traditional arm and points will be awarded for pre -1865 attire including Civil War costumes. NMLRA rules are used unless noted. Range Officer decisions are final. Separate divisions for Rifles and Smoothbores (Trade-guns/Fowlers). Food and Prizes! Sunday, Oct. 10, 2021

Lever Action Rifle Woods-Walk Shoot Saturday, Oct. 23, 2021

Primitive Range in Delaney Park at the Detroit Sportsmen's Congress.

This is a fun shoot for centerfire lever action rifles.

Registration: 9:45-11:30 a.m. The first safety briefing begins at 10 a.m. with the shoot commencing afterward.

Firearms with non-removable magazines will be loaded at the firing line only. Removable magazines may be loaded between stations but not inserted until the shooter is at the firing line.

Steel core ammo is not allowed.

There are four divisions; Adult – Iron Sights, Adult – Optical Sights, Junior – Iron Sights and Junior - Optical Sights.

Re-Entry for another division is allowed

The junior division is for shooters 16 and under.

Juniors must be accompanied by an adult.

The course of fire is five shots each on 10-hanging steel targets at various distances between 20 and 60 yards in the woods.

Range Officer scoring decisions are final.

Fee: \$10 per shooter. Shooters 16 and Under: \$5.

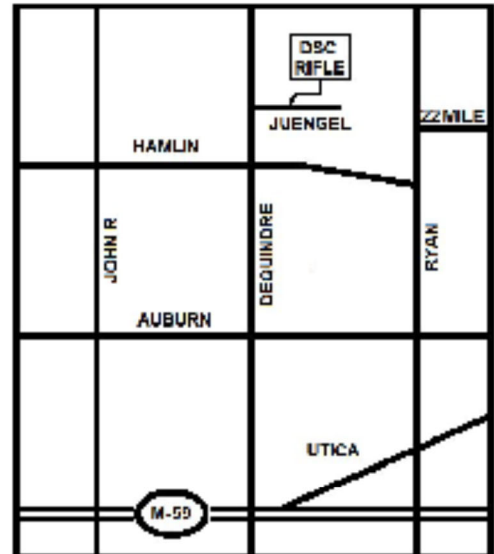

Cowboy—The Round-Up

In the cycle of ranch work, the round-up was the central event. It was the time when the stock was inventoried, branded and sorted.

The main round-up (which could take upwards to three months) was held in late spring, just as the grass was turning green. There was usually a smaller round-up in the fall.

There was a procedure in the performance of a round-up. The first duty of the cowboy was to ride over a given area of range and flush the cattle out of the chaparral, draws and other hiding places and drive them back to the round-up site. The area of the round-up could cover as much as 4,000 square miles and involve as many as 10,000 cattle. It was the cowboy's job to sweep the range clean.

A round-up required a number of specialized skills on the part of both cowboys and horses. Cowboys who separated cattle from the herd required the highest level of skill and rode specially trained "cutting horses", trained to follow the movements of cattle and capable of stopping and turning faster than other horses. When the cattle were finally gathered in the main corrals at the round-up site, the tasks of "cutting out" and "branding" began. Cattle were cut out or sorted for several purposes: to brand unmarked calves, to select the best stock for market or because they belonged to another rancher.

When the animal to be separated had been identified, the

cowboy would chase the dodging calf or longhorn steer with his cutting horse and finally rope it either by looping the lariat over the animal's head or by "heel roping" it.

A large number of horses were needed for the round-up. Each cowboy would require three to four fresh horses in the course of a day's work.

Besides cattle, horses were also rounded up. It was a common practice in the old west for young foals to be born of tame mares, but allowed to grow up wild, in a semi-feral state, on the open range. There were also "wild herds", often known as mustangs, that were rounded up. The animals were later tamed in a process called horse breaking or "bronco busting", usually performed by cowboys who specialized in training horses.

Once the sequence of the round-up was completed, preparations for the "cattle drive", or long drive, were begun in earnest. The cowboys would select their mounts; gather their gear and a small amount of personal belongings: a pair of blankets, change of clothing, hat, slicker (a "raincoat") and his gun. The recalcitrant calves and steers would start the long trail drive to market.

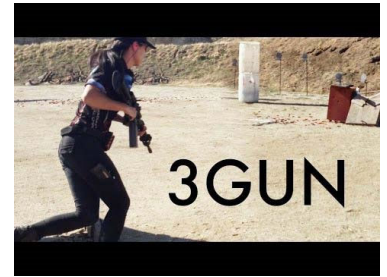
