Four of DSC's young archers competed in the state national JOAD championship Friday, Jan. 20. Dominic Monterosso, Natalie Monterosso, and Dakota Gentry captured gold medals in their respective archery class and division. Izzy Monterosso garnered silver in her class and division.

Friday, shooters focused on what they needed to perform their best. The archers were allowed three practice ends to help them get into a tournament mind set. They lasered in on the shooting process and started hitting high score right away.

During the last round of the first day's shooting, the archers figured out what they wanted to do after the tournament, eat pizza and swim at the hotel pool. The last end went very well with the final score giving our youngsters archers three golds and one silver medal,

The state indoor archery tournament, for all ages and bow classifications, was held Saturday and Sunday. Saturday morning, the team gathered, took photos, stretched out and talked to the other archers before the competition started. Once it began, the young archers were more nervous than on Friday. The adults were focusing more on the kids' than their own shooting. They helped the juniors get into their comfort zone and settle down. After a couple of scoring ends, everyone calmed down, began earning high scores again and having fun with the other archers.

Archers began feeling the wear of shooting two days straight on Sunday. But the team worked together and continued on page 13

Blackpowder

In the January issue, I had noted (some people said "whined") that I could no longer get the Hoppes "Black Powder Bore Cleaner and Patch Lubricant" Paul Behe was kind enough to give me some from his secret stash. It should be enough for several years of shooting. I thank Paul here for the Hoppes and for reading the article!

I couldn't think of a great topic to write about this month so I thought I would describe how I clean my muzzleloaders. I offer this description not as a model that people should follow but simply for informational purposes so you can compare it to what you do. First off, when I am shooting, mostly, I shoot in the local BP woods walks. These events are generally 15- to 20shot events. I generally do not clean between shots. However, since I am using the Hoppes product, I can generally shoot 15-20 shots and not have any difficulties in loading and accuracy is still pretty good at the end. When the shoot is over and I am still on the range, I like to preclean the bore using the Hoppes product. I alternate wet and dry patches to get the bulk of the crud out. This speeds cleaning at home but more importantly, it vastly cuts down on the sulfur smells that the wife finds objectionable. When I get home, I boil water in a kettle and pour it into an old coffee can. I add a couple of squirts of Dawn dishwashing liquid. I remove the lock and clean it separately using CLP or REM OIL - I use a brush to remove the carbon deposits from the hammer and such. Cleaning the bore is hydraulic as the cleaning solution is sucked up and down the bore. I may use a barrel scrapper to check for carbon deposits at the barrel bottom but mostly it is unnecessary. I also run a patch-covered brush down for a pass or two to get a little deeper cleaning. When the patches come out clean, I use dry patches on the bore and then use isopropyl alcohol to help dry the bore. The hot water had already warmed the bore and with the IPA there is little chance for flash rusting. I complete the process with a CLP or REM OIL soaked patch. I use the IPA on pipe cleaners to clean to drum and the coat lightly with the CLP. The nipple is cleaned by soaking it the aforementioned dawn liquid and a subsequent pipe cleaner application. This is what works for me. Let me know if you have any special thoughts on cleaning. One final note, this process takes me about the same amount of time as it does to clean a modern rifle. The cleaning materials are common cheap and generally safer on the user and there is no scrubbing needed to get the copper deposits out as with a modern gun.

This month's BP Woods walk is Sunday, March 12. Dust off your muzzleloader and come on out and give it a try.

DETROIT SPORTSMEN'S CONGRESS FEBRUARY GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING FEB. 1, 2023

The meeting started at 7 p.m. Food was available courtesy of Ms. Palmer and Ms. Studer. The meeting commenced with the Pledge of Allegiance and the Conservation Pledge. The President, Mr. Saylor, advised the members that Richard Gorney had passed and that the Club had offered their condolences. A minute of silence was observed. Life members and past presidents were recognized.

President's Report. Mr. Saylor presented Mr. John Barber who recognized Master Steven Bethell who is active in many sports including rifle shooting. He was awarded his NRA Distinguished Expert in Smallbore medal. Master Bethell spoke to the members and thanked them for their support. He looks forward to joining the shooting fraternity. Mr. Saylor commented that this activity is core to the club. He recognized the life members and thanked them for their continued work for the benefit of the club. Mr. Saylor is President of the Michigan Scholastic Clay Target Program and held a fundraiser at the DSC Jan. 28 to help this organization and raised \$19,432.

Secretary Mr. Wreford No Report

Treasurer Mr. Savo The Financial reports for December and year's end were given by the Treasurer as follows: monthly income \$79,951.85 monthly expenses \$31,283.05, net \$48,668.80, year to date income \$1,143,548.39, year to date expenses \$953,360.73, net \$190,187.66. He noted that the receipts from the membership dues do not cover the club's expenses and that the contributions by the club committees were what really kept the club in a good financial position. The new campground office will be all steel and work is in progress. An extra supply of clay targets has been purchased. Mr. Savo thanked the various committees for their efforts in supporting the club. Loans are under control. This is the seventeenth year that we are financially viable. All financials are available to members and are kept behind the club bar. The groundhog (Dufus 12) is under the direct protection of the treasurer and may not be shot, especially by the black powder committee who are having a groundhog event, with lunch. The treasurer will be checking.

1st Vice President Mr. Estes. The top step was repaired following a call from Mr. Pierce. Life member meeting will be at 2 p.m. Mar. 12. Mr. Saylor commented that push box in sporting clays will be fabricated by members of the club. The pro shop loading doors have been repaired. AED weatherproof boxes are being made. LED lighting has been installed. The archery sign is made. The roof of the clubhouse will be repaired by a Member. Campground office permits are submitted for the new office.

2nd Vice President Mr. Rhodes. The safety committee works to ensure that all members continue to be safe. All members should help clean up the snow wherever it lies.

Trustees, Mr. Murphy said that there are new supplies available in the pro shop. Members should check the P&K.

Mr. Silarski had no Report as did Mr. Salo.

23-003-PI-01 Motion to allow reduced range fees paid for shorter range times. Returned to Committee.

23-002-CG-01 Motion to approve the annual campground Winter Festival. Mr. Duey noted that any member may attend but only lot holders may stay overnight. Proposed Mr. Koehn, Seconded Mr. Savo APPROVED

23-001-AD-01 Motion to approve the donation of a gift basket worth \$500 to the Detroit Chapter of Safari Club Intl. for their banquet. Proposed Mr. Salo, Seconded Mr. Rhodes APPROVED

23-047-RI-12 Motion to approve the replacement of the rifle range 200-yard target bases, not to exceed \$1,500. Returned to the rifle committee for review because of the change in the specification of the materials. Returned to committee.

Operations Manager Ms. Palmer. Feb. 24 will start the weekly Fish Fry. A rib dinner is in planning. The President expressed his appreciation of the work being done to provide food for the meeting.

Member of the Month. This was awarded to Mr. Joe Lupi noting his continued work for the club as Chairman of the Board and as the cowbov committee chairman.

Any new ones can only be sold by a Class 3 dealer. The club does not have a Class 3 license. He mentioned that we now supply an AR rifle class. MCGRO asked if we could put such a class together for them. It has now been approved. There are 20 million of this type of rifle in the country. The club paid our taxes for the Dequindre property for \$9910 and \$5613 for the campground. Other expenses such as insurance continue to be paid on time. There is a new E system in place. Rifle can be converted so as to not need a license.

Pistol

Way back in 1962, my Aunt Joan took me to see a movie at our local theater. The name of the movie was "Dr. No", staring Scottish actor Sean Connery. The film completely captured my attention and I immediately became a James Bond fan. British novelist Ian Fleming created the fictional secret agent working for MI6 (Military Intelligence, section six) under the codename 007. Fleming had written 12 novels and two short story collections featuring Bond before he passed away in 1964. There have been 27 James Bond productions, making it the longest continually running film series of all time. Fast cars (Aston Martin DB5), charismatic wit, top of the line wrist watches (Rolex, Breitling, Omega), impeccably tailored clothing, super cool gadgets (the trusty attache case, the explosive pen), awesome villains (Oddjob, Ernst Stavro Blofeld, Jaws), the theme songs (three have won the Academy Award for Best Original Song) and martinis, shaken, not stirred, are all a part of Bond's world. But, what about his signature weapon? What kind of pistol does agent 007 pack? From the very beginning of his cinematic tenure, Bond has been armed with his iconic Walther PPK. Developed by the German arms manufacturer Carl Walther GmbH Sportwaffen, the PPK (Polizei Pistole Kriminal) came to market in the early 1930s. The PPK is a blowback-operated semi-automatic pistol. It features an exposed hammer, a traditional double-action trigger mechanism, a single-column magazine and a fixed barrel that also acts as the guide rod for the recoil spring. It was among the world's first successful double action, semi-automatic pistols. The compact PPK went on to become very popular post World War II. It was used in covert roles in many countries including the United States CIA and FBI, British Intelligence Agencies MI5 and MI6 and France's SDECE. Bond's PPK is chambered for .32 ACP rounds, a popular bullet available all over the world, which is useful for an agent like 007. The weapon is smaller than many handguns, sparing Bond's tuxedos from those unattractive creases.

A Final Thought... Actor Jack Lord, who played Felix Leiter in "Dr. No", was presented with a gold-plated PPK with ivory handgrips, given to him by his friend Elvis Presley. Presley himself owned a silver-finish PPK, Inscribed "TCB" (taking care of business).
