The online class is \$50 plus \$35 for the background check. When completed the student can sign up for the practice course. The practical class is free. Deadly Blizzards in the Old West

The 1880s had some terrible devastating blizzards. For example, the year 1887 had a blizzard that obliterated cattle herds in Wyoming, Montana and Dakota Territory. This was not the only destructive storm of the era. In January 1886, a blizzard took the lives of approximately 100 people and wiped out about 75% of the beeves in Kansas. Journalists recounted about settlers dying within feet of their snow covered homes. One prominent story reported how a stagecoach lost in the storm pulled up at a military garrison in Indian Territory (present day Oklahoma), but when the weary passengers disembarked the stagecoach, they saw the coach's dead driver to be frozen to his seat on top of the stage.

Jan. 12, 1888, a blizzard hit Nebraska and Dakota Territory and killed more than 200 people. This was an unforeseen storm that arrived without warning on a somewhat warm day catching the people by surprise with sudden wind, snow and zero degree temperatures. As one Norwegian immigrant recalled, "A dark and heavy wall builded up around the northwest coming fast." Farmers were in their fields and children were in school as the blizzard slammed them. Thus, this deadly storm was nicknamed "The Schoolhouse Blizzard."

Was the Garand "Ping" Dangerous?

The readers of this column are, I'm sure, familiar with the Garand Rifle. It was the main battle rifle for the US in World War II and many of you have shot or owned one. One of its more unusual features is the use of an En Bloc clip. Eight cartridges with clip are loaded as one unit into the rifle. When the last round in the clip is fired the clip is ejected with a characteristic "ping" sound. This "ping" sound is the subject of this article.

However, before we get to that, I would like to remind the readers that the En Bloc clip was not John Garand's idea. He actually wanted and designed a detachable magazine that could be fed by stripper clips. However, in the 1920s the military was leaning towards adopting, not the Garand but a semiautomatic rifle developed by John Pederson. It is he who promoted the idea of the En Bloc. There are a few good reasons for it. In a combat situation, where motor skills are reduced, it is easier to load an En Bloc clip of eight rounds as opposed to fumbling with fiveround stripper clips. For proof, watch any Civilian Marksmanship Program games match where the contestants are loading from stripper clips. Fumbling is a mild term to what I have observed. The idea of just using detachable magazine as a disposable item was thought to be too expensive or wasteful. Of course, detachable magazines are now king and En Blocs are a thing of the past.

Let's get back to our story. If you watch enough TV history shows or read enough Gun Magazine articles, you will likely find mention of that characteristic "ping" and that this noise was an issue for solders in combat. As explained, the "ping" would alert the enemy that you have an empty gun and they could rush forward and kill you while you were reloading. Now, on face value this seems far-fetched. First, how does the enemy know that you are alone? Second, reloading a Garand is usually quite rapid. Third, there is a lot of noise in combat. How is someone going to make out that "ping" noise with rifle fire and grenades going off all over? Well, we have all heard this scenario. We know its suspect. So were did this story come from?

I searched my reference library for clues. Julian Hatcher was deeply involved with the Army Ordnance department between the World Wars. He was intimately involved with the semiautomatic rifle development program and in World War II, He was chief of ordnance



training. He wrote two excellent books that are standard references for the development of the small arms in general (Hatchers Notebook) and the Garand in particular (The Book of the Garand). Neither book makes mention of the deadly "ping" Next, I tried "Ordnance Went Up Front" by Roy Dunlap. JACKPOT! Here is a quote from page 293 - "In jungle warfare visibility usually was limited and sound played an important part. Japs on Guadalcanal learned that the "Ping" of an ejecting M1 clip meant a momentarily-empty rifle and American riflemen died because of it. Aberdeen was in a slight furor for a while, trying to silence the noise, make plastic clips, etc." Now Roy Dunlap was an accomplished high power shooter. During World War II, he worked ordnance repairing small arms both in the North Africa and in the Philippines. After the war, he became a famous writer on gun repair and other shooting sports related topics. He should be a good source.

Or is he? Dunlap cited no references so we have no way to trace how he came to the observation quoted above. However, the quotation gives us two clues to work with. The first is that "Aberdeen was in a slight furor...." I am sure this is a reference to the Aberdeen proving grounds which would be under the prevue of the Ordnance Department. So if this statement was true, why didn't Hatcher mention it in either of his books? The quotation also references Guadalcanal as being the focus of this issue. Perhaps someone who was there observed this issue. It so happens that we have an account by a Guadalcanal veteran. His name is John B. George. His book in entitled "Shots Fired in Anger." John had combat experience there and being another High power shooter wrote on the arms and equipment he saw used on the island. Does he make any mention of the deadly "Ping"? The answer is no. We can't say for sure, we weren't there, but it sure looks like the "ping" was not a significant issue. I think what happened is that Dunlap is repeating a story he heard second hand and this story seems more like rumor than fact. Given the lack of references for the Dunlap quote, and the lack of mention of the "Ping by both George and Hatcher, we can conclude that the dangerous "ping" was likely a myth. While theoretically possible, it just wasn't a real cause for concern.

President (B. Saylor) Opened the meeting at 7 p.m. by summarizing the newly BOD approved camera surveillance security system. Meeting later this week with suppliers to finalize camera locations that will be throughout the DSC Dequindre road property (buildings, ranges, parking lots). See Mr. Lupi's BOD report on BOD business items recently discussed. There will not be a Feb. general membership meeting, next meeting in March.

1st Vice President: (J. Estes) Reported that work is now indoors focused on equipment maintenance (mowers etc.)

2nd Vice President: (J. Rhodes) Reported no incidents last month. With snow/ice season here, ensure range access is safe – and prepare for it (shovel snow, apply salt etc.). If materials are needed, they can be picked up at the office. Never shovel snow alone.

Secretary: (T. Crockatt) Dec. 6 GMM minutes published in the Jan. P&K, and also posted behind the bar.

Treasurer: (R. Savo) The November financial report was reviewed, the highlights are:

Nov.: income = \$55,523; expenses = \$99,467; for a net (loss) = \$(43,938)

Main reasons for Nov. loss is property tax payments and large pro shop purchase (to mitigate higher prices coming in 2024) YTD (thru Nov): income = \$1,043,120; expense = \$932,697; for a net gain = \$108,423

Kubota loan balance is \$5,213 (at 0%)

Mr. Savo stated that DSC generated \$1million+ in revenue for the 17th straight year. He also reinforced that committee generated income is key as dues alone are not sufficient.

Motion to accept treasurers report was approved.

Trustee: (T. Murphy) No trustee report. Pro shop has some added items, so check it out – including the life member unique item display. Air rifle/pistol league has started – contact office or Mr. Murphy for details.

Trustee: (E. Silarski) Approved 2024 budgets have been distributed to committee chairs.

Member of the Month: (B. Saylor) January member of the month is postponed unit March.



HUNTER EDUCATION CLASS Traditional & Field Day (Spring Class) Saturday and Sunday, April 13 & 14, 2024

"Be a safe Hunter"

Presented by: Detroit Sportsmen's Congress in cooperation with the Michigan DNR

Learn how to be a safe hunter and earn your certificate. Class taught by state certified hunter education instructors. Class is required for anyone born after 1959 to get a hunting license.

We offer two classes that run together. First is the traditional full two-day class (Sat. & Sun.). Second is the field day class which is one day (Sunday only). The field day class is for students who have completed the online hunter education course, but are also required to have instruction offered on Sunday (law, test and practicals). Register for one class only. If you sign up for the traditional, you do not have to sign up for the field day class. If you sign up for the field day class, you have to have completed the online hunter education class. (60 students limit each class)

DSC 2024 Service Rifle Clinic & Match

The purpose of this clinic is to provide instruction and training for the new shooter in Service Rifle competition. Emphasis placed on positions, rules, competition and match operations. Clinic is open to any US citizen 14 years or older with a maximum number of 40 students. Instruction provided by certified CMP Garand master instructors and NRA rifle instructors, who are also competitive rifle shooters. The DSC offers a yearly service rifle league. This will allow you to apply what you have learned and continue to improve your marksmanship. Entry fees include all class material, match, ammunition fees and the use of a rifle. Due to range capacity and course materials, we require a non-refundable registration fee of \$40 for this clinic and match. You may also join the club to get the member discount. Deposits must be received before 19 April 2024, entries received after this date will be placed on stand-by. Confirmations, by email unless you include a self-addressed post card with your entry.
